<p>Benefits CLICK HERE</p>	<p>From 6 April 2020, for 12 months, the standard allowance in Universal Credit (UC) and the basic element in Working Tax Credit (WTC) will be increased by £20 a week over and above the planned annual uprating.</p> <p>This will apply to all new and existing UC claimants and to existing WTC claimants.</p>	<p>For those not entitled to SSP (e.g. the self-employed and gig economy workers), Contributory Employment and Support Allowance (ESA – a basic £73.10 a week for those 25 and over, rising to £74.35 in 2020/21) will be claimable from day one instead of day eight.</p> <p>To ensure that time off work due to sickness is reflected in benefits, the minimum income floor** in Universal Credit (UC) is temporarily removed if an individual gets coronavirus or has to stay at home because of it.</p> <p>The minimum income floor won't apply to anyone after 6 April 2020. **The minimum income floor is usually what someone of the same age would earn if they worked at the National Minimum Wage [CLICK HERE](#) for the number of hours that the self-employed individual is expected to work or look for work. Normally, if the self-employed individual earns less than the minimum income floor, UC will not make up the difference.
